Public Health and Safety

Coronavirus (COVID-19): Weekly Report: As of January 29, 2021

Regarding vaccinations, the State has rolled out appointments for Vermonters over the age of 75. Governor Scott reminded us all that there will be enough appointment slots for every eligible Vermonter. The State also discussed that if a larger supply of vaccine becomes available, they can quickly scale up and broaden availability.

Remember though, that even with vaccines becoming available, we have not escaped the impact of COVID-19. There are still thousands of cases in Vermont, and right now, even Bennington now has more active cases per million than any VT county since the start of the pandemic. We all still have a moral obligation to stay safe, follow the guidelines, and try to reduce those who get sick in our communities.

STREETS DIVISION:

The DPW streets Division focused on daytime and overnight snow removal in various locations throughout the City, as well as plowing, sanding/salting. Our crew also began hanging ParkMobile signs throughout the city in preparation for ParkMobile to being.

The Department of Public Works is made up of 5 divisions - Engineers & Office Staff, Streets, Water/Sewer, Montpelier Water Resource Recovery Facility (WRRF) and the Water Treatment Plant.

Our staff works on all sorts of projects that maintain the City's infrastructure, and each of the members of our team bring skills to these efforts. Beginning with this notice, we'll be introducing you to our team. We hope that you'll be interested in and appreciate learning about our employees. Watch for Department of Public Works posts! We'll be introducing one employee a month.

Our first employee is Christopher Cox, Chief Operator of the Montpelier Water Resource Recovery Facility.

Chris was born and raised in Graniteville, VT, graduated from Spaulding High School in 2006 and then graduated from Colby-Sawyer College with a BS in Environmental Science in 2010. He now happily lives in Williamstown, VT with his wife, Julie, 1 year old daughter Samantha and their dog Mowgli.

As Chief Operator Chris has many responsibilities, but the three most important are: ensuring the safety of all the Operators, producing high quality effluent (sewage that's been treated so it can be safely discharged) and having the facility process wastewater as efficiently as possible.

Chris has been employed with the City of Montpelier for 9 years, and has been the Chief Operator of the WRRF for the last 4 ½ years.

We asked Chris what his favorite specialty within his job was, and he answered Process Optimization. Chris stated "The facility uses aerobic and anaerobic bacteria to process wastewater and I enjoy trying different/new strategies to optimize the biological process."

Montpelier, Vermont, Partners with ParkMobile to Offer Contactless Parking Payments

Residents and visitors can now easily pay for parking from their mobile device. [ParkMobile](#), the #1 parking app in the U.S., announced today a new partnership with Montpelier, Vermont, enabling residents and visitors to pay for parking on their mobile device. The ParkMobile app is now available at more than 600 on and off-street spaces throughout the city. With the recent COVID-19 crisis, municipal leaders across the country are encouraging residents and visitors to use the app instead of the meter to prevent the spread of the virus.

We'll be updating this site quarterly, so you can see our recent steps towards goals and actions relating to Community Prosperity, our COVID-19 Response, Responsive and Responsible Government, More Housing, Environmental Stewardship, and Sustainable Infrastructure.

The City Council's 2020-2021 Strategic Plan allows the City to prioritize new projects and initiatives that serve to further Council's vision for the City. The 2020-2021 Strategic Plan was born from a collaborative process between both the City Council and City staff, and provides the City a guiding vision that helps move our employees, residents, and community towards the overall goals and vision.

The City of Montpelier will continue to strive to be the best that it can, and having a strategy to get there is our first step in achieving that vision. Our 2020-2021 Strategic Plan also allows the City to build transparency about its goals, and allows us to report our progress about how well we accomplished our goals to the public.

Budget Question Answered **NEW**

How does uncollected taxes, which is a liability get treated? How is it recorded? A: Each year the tax year is closed on June 30th. Any delinquent taxes owed are recorded in the general fund and the balance is reduced as payments are received. Per our audit, property tax revenues are

recognized when they become available. Available includes those property tax receivables to be collected within sixty days after year end. The remaining receivables are recorded as deferred revenues.

Zoning amendments forwarded to Council for consideration. On January 11, the Planning Commission voted to send another set of zoning changes to the City Council for consideration. This most recent set of changes will address three topics:

1. Sabin's Pasture: There were two changes requested to help facilitate development in the Sabins pasture area. First were changes to how traffic is regulated in the zoning. These changes fix inconsistencies in the bylaws between two sections (3303 and 3504), eliminates the level of service as a guideline for determining "undue adverse effect", and eliminates the requirement that a New Neighborhood Planned Unit Development must be used in the Riverfront district.
2. Housing changes: Due to changes in state law in 2020, amendments needed to be made to the zoning. Those requirements included how we regulate small non-conforming parcels, make changes to the use table (figure 2-15) so that some conditional uses will now be permitted uses, and also make some changes to accessory dwelling units. There is also a second set of housing related changes to address some outstanding issues and internal inconsistencies. These are relatively minor and mostly address how we group housing uses (into dwelling units and congregate living) and the related changes associated with that fix.
3. Finally we have miscellaneous changes that have been found while using the bylaws: these including items like fixing very minor changes on the riparian buffers on the Natural Resources map, fixing and error in the lines that were made during the last Design Review Boundary amendments, adding some rules on how to address requests for reasonable accommodations for ADA, and a number of minor technical fixes.

Shared Committee Documents:

It has come to the attention of the City Manager's Office that some City Committees and Boards may be using technology such as 'Google Docs' and other external document repository sites to host and edit shared documents. This can be considered best practice in some lines of work, as it helps streamline work and cuts back on deliberation on documents in meetings. However, as City Committee's and Boards are public meetings, and are extensions of City Government, they need to keep in mind Vermont's Open Meeting Laws. There are very limited exceptions as to when something like Google Docs can be used, and most of the time its use is a violation of the Open Meeting Law.

The Vermont League of Cities and Towns wrote the following, to aid in clarifying appropriate use:

- **Can municipal public bodies use social media and programs such as Google Docs without violating the Open Meeting Law?**
 - Yes, but only for limited purposes. Vermont's Open Meeting Law permits municipal public bodies to communicate electronically outside the context of a duly warned open meeting for the purpose of scheduling a meeting, creating an agenda, and distributing information to be discussed at a meeting. While other electronic

communications – through platforms such as Google Docs, Facebook, Front Porch Forum, or texting are not explicitly addressed in the Open Meeting Law, they are likely prohibited if the communications are between a quorum (majority) of the members of the public body and the subject of discussion is a matter that is within the authority of that public body.

- Vermont law does not explicitly state that the use of social media or software such as Google Docs violates the Open Meeting Law. Nor, on the other hand, does it carve out an explicit exception for these uses. However, the law is clear that participation at a meeting by electronic means is the legal equivalent to physical participation. As such, members of a public body must assume that electronic communication will be treated the same as in-person communication; therefore, electronic communication between a quorum of members will only be legal if it occurs in the context of a duly warned open meeting.
- *Note: The Open Meeting Law does allow members of a public body to attend and participate in a meeting electronically or by other means without being physically present, so long as certain requirements are met.*

In response, the City Manager's Office is proposing changes to the City Committee & Board Member Policy to outline the need to not use external document hosting and editing sites. Since City Committees and Boards are under the City Council's purview and management, the policy needs to be adopted by Council. This will be on the February 12th agenda/

Montpelier City Hall Receives Outdoor Wi-Fi Hotspot **NEW**

The City of Montpelier, through the Department of Public Service (PSD) Wi-Fi Hot Spot Program has installed new public Wi-Fi outside the City Hall Building (39 Main Street Montpelier). This PSD sponsored project is in response to the widespread closure of facilities due to the COVID-19 outbreak, which has significantly limited folks' ability to access free and reliable internet. The need for access to a reliable internet connections for healthcare, education, and government services has grown exponentially while existing public access points have become suddenly unavailable due to social distancing requirements. Vermont PSD has assisted the City in addressing this emergency gap in available public Wi-Fi by contracting for the rapid installation of a commercial-grade outdoor Wireless Access Point. They have installed 190 hotspots throughout the State as part of this program. Montpelier is pleased to have been included.

The City Hall Wi-Fi site is accessible at all hours from a parked vehicle on the road or in-person in the courtyard in front of City Hall and the parking lot to the immediate right of the building. As a COVID-19 safety precaution, the City discourages users from congregating outside. The Wi-Fi name is "**Montpelier Hotspot**" and you should be able to connect without a password.

Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP)! Needs your help! **NEW**

The City of Montpelier is looking for help identifying local safety hazards to assist in editing the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP)! Hazard Mitigation Plans aim to develop long-term strategies

for protecting people and property from future hazard events. Hazard mitigation is the effort to reduce loss of life and property damage by lessening the impact of safety hazard events or disasters. This is accomplished by identifying risks and vulnerabilities associated with natural and other risks. Hazard mitigation is most effective when implemented through a strategic, comprehensive, and long-term Hazard Mitigation Plan, which are reviewed and updated every 5 years. A FEMA approved LHMP is a requirement for receiving certain FEMA assistance. The City of Montpelier, in collaboration with the Central Vermont Regional Planning Commission, has begun the LHMP update process and is looking for input from Montpelier residents to help identify the hazards that impact the City.

Due to the public health crisis, not only is our city seeing a shortage on toilet paper, but many communities are as well. ***The Department of Public Works would like to remind everyone about what should NOT be flushed.*** Flushing the items listed below could cause sewer blockages, which could cause plugged and overflowing toilets, poorly draining sinks and showers, raw sewage backing up through floor drains and/or manholes overflowing onto the ground or into nearby surface waters, health hazards and nuisance odors, and this could result in increases in the City's maintenance costs and costly repair bills for involved residents.

The following items should NOT be flushed!

- Paper towels
- Baby wipes
- Moist towelettes
- Cosmetics and cosmetic wipes
- Cloth or paper napkins
- Shop towels
- Condoms
- Tampons and pads
- Diapers
- Cat litter
- Cigarette butts
- Dental floss
- Latex gloves
- Hypodermic needles
- Facial tissues
- Fats, oils or grease
- Clothing or rags
- Medications (pills or liquid)
- Bandages
- Cotton balls
- Food scrapes
- Swiffer pads
- Plastic of any kind
