
Public Health and Safety

Coronavirus (COVID-19): Weekly Report: As of March 19, 2021

As of today: 166,100 people in Vermont have been vaccinated, including 88,800 who have gotten both doses. However, as we turn this vaccination corner- it's been a full year since the first deaths in Vermont attributed to COVID-19 occurred, and 215 other Vermonters have died since then. We all need to continue to wear masks, stay distant, wash our hands, and avoid crowded spaces to ensure there is no further loss of life.

Overall State Updates:

- Update:
 - As of March 24th, bars and clubs will be able to open under the restaurant guidance, with capacity limits and distancing. Towns can take stricter action on bars and clubs if elected officials opt to do that.
- Vaccine Updates
 - Starting Thursday, March 25th, Vermonters age 60+ will become eligible to get the vaccine.
 - On March 29th, those age 50+. On April 5th, those aged 40+. On April 12th, those aged 30+. On April 19th, anyone 16+ can schedule their vaccine.

- Reminder: Gathering Guidelines
 - Governor Phil Scott announced updates to COVID-19 guidance for small, multi-household gatherings and table seating at restaurants. Effective March 12, 2021, the changes allow two unvaccinated households to gather at a time, and permit restaurants to seat multiple households together, but no more than six people can be seated at the same table. Masking, distancing, capacity limits, and other mitigation guidelines remain in place. Read the full guidance updates here.
- Reminder: Travel and Quarantine Guidelines
 - Effective February 23rd, those who are fully vaccinated (meaning two weeks after their second dose), will not need to quarantine after traveling. This also means those who come to Vermont from other states will not need to quarantine if they can prove they have been fully vaccinated.  - New Quarantine requirements have been outlined in this updated chart.
- o Reminder: Federal Stimulus Legislation Update
 - From the just-passed Federal COVID-19 relief legislation, most folks will be receiving \$1,400 for all individuals in a household, including dependents and children. The child tax credit will be increased to \$3,000 for kids over the age of 6 and \$3,600 for kids under the age of 6.
 - Unemployment benefits will be extended until September, with an additional \$300
 weekly supplement to the normal Unemployment Benefits. There will also be a tax
 deduction for these benefits, up to a set amount, that people received in 2020.

MSAC and Supporting Town Funding Results, Benefits, Gratitude!

Thank you to all who helped make MSAC's supporting town funding possible in six towns: Berlin, Calais, East Montpelier, Middlesex, Moretown and Worcester. Yes votes on our funding request articles ranged from 70-88% and will result in a total of \$39,500 in funding to support senior activity center operations for older adults in our region between July 2021 and June 2022, just \$500 less than in the current fiscal year. The highest appropriation, at \$15,000, will be from Berlin, where MSAC's FEAST Senior Meal Program delivers Meals on Wheels to dozens of residents each year. Residents of the six supporting towns receive the benefits of lower annual dues if joining MSAC as members, more access to financial aid, and more access to high-demand programs compared with residents of other towns. In the last membership year, MSAC served at least 335 unduplicated people from the six towns, which accounts for nearly a quarter of all people served.

Social Equity & Justice Advisory Committee

The Committee is working with consulting firm Creative Discourses, Inc. to develop information about the community. Creative Discourses is holding a series of meetings with city staff to learn more about the work environment, unintentional biases, etc.

Montpelier Community Justice Center

The Montpelier Community Justice Center provides Restorative Justice services for Montpelier residents including Restorative Justice Panels, Reentry services, Circles of Support and Accountability and Victim Outreach. Additionally, the Conflict Assistance Program provides

The City Council has enacted the temporary parklet ordinance which was in place last summer and expired on October 25, 2020. This will allow restaurants and merchants to take advantage of the same relaxed standards this summer as it appears that COVID restrictions will continue. The second, and final reading took place at the March 10, 2021 City Council Meeting. The new ordinance will be effective from April 1, 2021 through November 2, 2021. Montpelier, Vermont, Partners with ParkMobile to Offer Contactless Parking Payments

Residents and visitors can now easily pay for parking from their mobile device through ParkMobile! ParkMobile is the #1 parking app in the U.S., and has a new partnership going live with our City, enabling residents and visitors to pay for parking on their mobile device. The ParkMobile app is now available at more than 600 on and off-street spaces throughout the city.

ParkMobile is available for both iPhone and Android devices. To pay for parking with the ParkMobile app, a user enters the zone number posted on the stickers and signs around the meters. The user then selects the amount of time needed and touches the "Start Parking" button to begin the session. The user can then extend the time of the parking session right from the app without having to go back to the meter. We are excited to add this to our parking options!

Other payment options, such as coins and credit cards, will still be accepted.

Alternate Side Parking:

Getting the Message Out! Public Works has been posting messages on social media and on our web page informing residents of key changes, and directing readers to go the City website to look up specifics for where they typically park, whether that be during the daytime, evenings or both. Social Worker Available to Residents

The Montpelier Police Department, the Barre City Police Department and Washington County Mental Health have partnered in providing an onsite social worker to help residents in crisis or needing an extra hand during the pandemic. Susan Lemere has been a friendly and effective presence in town for the last several month, but COVID has slowed our outreach efforts down. City Hall Outdoor Wi-Fi Hotspot

The City of Montpelier, through the Department of Public Service (PSD) Wi-Fi Hot Spot Program has installed a public Wi-Fi outside the City Hall Building (39 Main Street Montpelier). This PSD sponsored project is in response to the widespread closure of facilities due to the COVID-19 outbreak, which has significantly limited folks' ability to access free and reliable internet. The need for access to a reliable internet connections for healthcare, education, and government services has grown exponentially while existing public access points have become suddenly unavailable due to social distancing requirements. Vermont PSD has assisted the City in addressing this emergency gap in available public Wi-Fi by contracting for the rapid installation of a commercial-grade outdoor Wireless Access Point. They have installed 190 hotspots throughout the State as part of this program. Montpelier is pleased to have been included.

The City Hall Wi-Fi site is accessible at all hours from a parked vehicle on the road or in-person in the courtyard in front of City Hall and the parking lot to the immediate right of the building. As a COVID-19 safety precaution, the City discourages users from congregating outside. The Wi-Fi name is "**Montpelier Hotspot**" and you should be able to connect without a password.
