COVID-19 Response- Updated:

NEW: It is now recommended that those age 50+ or those who are immunocompromised age 12+ receive a second booster dose of either the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine. The FDA's guidance can be found [here](#). Find vaccination clinics [here](#), or call your preferred pharmacy.

Update: The State has released their newest [COVID-19 Modeling Report, from April 5th, 2022](#). According to their data, "Vermont's COVID-19 case load increased by 70, with the state averaging 150 confirmed infections per day. This increase comes as the proportion of the BA.2 Omicron subvariant grew 11% to an estimated 84% of all New England cases" With this trend, please make sure you are taking steps to remain healthy and to protect yourself and others!

The number of booster doses administered in Vermont increased this week with the recommendation that those 50 and older and those with certain underlying health conditions receive a second booster dose of either the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine.

COVID-19 Reminders:

- The health department now recommends that people who test positive isolate for five days, with the caveat that if you still have symptoms after completing isolation, you might choose to take extra precautions such as wearing a mask, which helps protect you and the people around you from getting or spreading COVID-19. Public Lockers

Council will take up the conversation about public lockers at the April 13th Meeting. To give more context about the request, since 2019 or before, the Homelessness Task Force and members of the Montpelier community experiencing homelessness have been advocating for publically accessible lockers. Lockers would be used to allow those living without shelter a secure space to store valuables and belongings. In response to this, City staff decided, based on Council priorities, to focus on some short-term projects that could assist those experiencing homelessness, and to readdress the locker issue. City Staff discussed many location options for lockers and worked through policies that could assist in keeping the lockers safe and secure for all.

City staff gained approval from the Design Review Committee on February 22nd to locate lockers behind the Rec Center at 55 Barre St, and will be seeking approval or feedback from Council during the upcoming meeting. Benefits of the Barre St. location are that it is out of the floodplain, gives privacy (therefore dignity) to those using the lockers while still being visible from both Barre Street and Stone Cutters Way, it's well lit, close to downtown, and requires no additional construction.

Other locations that staff discussed were by City Hall, which was rejected because City Hall is in the floodplain, and structures cannot be built underneath fire escapes or blocking ADA ramps- which takes the back of City Hall out of consideration. Other locations discussed included the Blanchard lot, which was also rejected as it would take parking spaces offline, would disrupt snow removal/storage, and would require considerable infrastructure being built to support the lockers. Staff looks forward to the upcoming conversation!

Guertin Park structure:

This will be on the April 13 Council agenda. Feedback from the April 7th Special Homelessness Task force on this topic will be given.

Regional Dispatch Infrastructure:

Public Safety teams in Montpelier and Barre continue to work toward implementation of the Televate plan created by CVPSA. A full update on these efforts will be provided to the Barre City Council on April 12th and the Montpelier City Council on April 13th. The Governor's budget includes \$11-\$14M for regional dispatch systems. City and CVPSA officials are advocating for \$3.2-\$4M to build out the Central Vermont system as per the Televate plan.

Preston made a goal of Honoring every towns veteran's from Redding to Sacramento CA, this goal was accomplished last summer. Build and Maintain Sustainable Infrastructure

Grout Road Bridge: The project is to be constructed in the summer of 2022. This project is funded by a Class II town highway structures grant in the amount of \$175,000 and an FY23 improvement bond of approximately \$225,000. The Department of Public Works engineering staff has asked for a proposal from VHB, the engineering firm who completed the initial design, for a proposal to complete the necessary contract documents, and to obtain any permits required for the project. The completion of this project is expected prior to the winter of 2022.

LED Street Light Conversion: Initially this project entailed converting all the lights in the downtown to LED and fixing major wiring issues, poles bases, performing long deferred maintenance. This winter, twenty-seven of the lights were not functional in the immediate downtown. Due to safety concerns, a contractor was solicited to evaluate the lighting and it was determined that non-functioning lights along with the remaining downtown lights could converted to LED though the much lower cost of just bulb replacement. This project will now be expanded to also convert lights along Bailey Ave, the Bike Path between the Montpelier High School and the Water Resource Recovery Facility, Stonecutters Way, Pioneer Street Bridge and Route 2/302 roundabout, as well as correct any structural issues of the pole bases and rewiring as needed based on field testing. After completion of the LED conversion of streets lights any remaining bond funds would be used to for improvements to signalized intersections.

Marvin Street Slope: The slope along Marvin Street between College Street and Bingham Street has been slowly dropping toward the ravine on the North side of the Street. DPW has been monitoring the slope for approximately five years. After consultation with a geotechnical engineering firm, it was determined that the most economical solution to the issue is to stabilize the slope using a non-intrusive method of installing soil nails. This type of work is ideal for this location and will allow for the contractor to perform all work from the existing paved road with support from DPW. DPW anticipates completing the project in the summer of 2022.

Paving Program FY23: This year's paving program will include two new processes which will help DPW to preserve and improve the overall condition of the Montpelier Street network. The first new process is known as FOG seal which will preserve and extend the life of the pavement an additional 3-5 years. Though it may be counter-intuitive to invest in streets that are not in poor condition, it is an important component in pavement management and will reduce the cost to taxpayers over the long term. Streets scheduled to be treated with the FOG seal are as follows: *College Street, National Life Drive, Northfield Street* and the parking lot at the Water Treatment Plant.

The other new treatment scheduled for this year is known as cold-in place recycling which is similar to the traditional mill and fill (grind and pave), however it allows for the entire pavement depth to be restored. The existing pavement is ground up and used to create the rehabilitated roadway by adding asphalt liquids to create a new pavement. After the process is complete, each street gets overlaid with a thin layer of asphalt. Streets scheduled to be treated with the cold-in place recycling are as follows: *Main Street from the roundabout to Towne Hill Road, Phelps Street, Wheelock Street, Roberts Street, Pleasantview Street, Valerie Ave, and Blodgett Ave.* Work will begin after the July 4th, 2022 holiday with completion prior to the winter of 2022. Other streets that may be included with the contract but are dependent on bid pricing received include: *Hillside Avenue, Cliff Street, and Cummings Street.*

Paving Program FY22: *Westwood Drive* is scheduled to be reconstructed via a reclamation process of grinding the existing asphalt into gravel subbase, with new asphalt installed over it. This project is funded through the American Rescue Plan Act. The contractor for this project is ECI who was the low bidder for the FY22 paving program. The work is scheduled to start in the spring of 2022 with a completion date prior to July 1, 2022.

State Street CSO: The Department of Public works has hired Engineering Firm, Dufresne Group to finish the design plans to eliminate a siphon within the sewer main along State Street between the courthouse and the DMV. The design is nearing 50% completion with the project to be bid by the end of May. Bids will be opened by June with construction slated to start after the July 4, 2022 holiday. The project will also remove approximately 1 acre of stormwater that directly enters the sewer system. By removing the siphon and eliminating the amount of stormwater entering the sewer system, staff anticipates a significant reduction in the frequency and volume of CSO overflow events at CSO-01, located at the intersection of State St. and Taylor Street. Work is scheduled to be completed prior to the winter of 2022.

Phelps Street Sidewalk and storm drain improvements: Prior to and in conjunction

with the cold- in place recycling project Phelps Street storm drains and sidewalks will be replaced. The storm drains on this street are in extremely poor condition. DPW will contract out the replacement of this section of storm lines using ARPA funds prior to July 1, 2022. Once the storm drain improvements have been completed, DPW will reconstruct the sidewalks with new asphalt curb and sidewalk. After the completion of both the storm drain project and the sidewalk replacement the street will be scheduled for re-paving. All work is scheduled to be completed prior to the winter of 2022.

Montpelier WRRF – Phase 2: DPW is working with engineering firm Brown and Caldwell on the Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) for the second phase of improvements at the Water Resource Recovery Facility. These reports evaluate alternatives for equipment and identify any potential environmental impacts. The PER is expected to be completed in mid-April and final design is planned to begin toward the end of May, 2022. The project includes drying of bio-solids, which will reduce landfill disposal costs, rehabilitation of the secondary clarifiers (settling tanks) and new odor control equipment. Construction is expected to start in the Spring of 2023 with project completion in the summer of 2024.
